The Minnesota Navy League had the great honor of exhibiting at the Minnesota State Fair during Military Appreciation Day on August 29, 2023. This was a tremendous opportunity to highlight what we do as a council and to offer veterans the opportunity to join our organization.

A big highlight of the event was to be able to present the Como Park MCJROTC with an award of \$1000 to recognize their phenomenal program. The Como Park Marine Corps JROTC continues to be

recognized as a Naval Honor School Program due to unit enrollment, volunteer campaigns, cadet citizenship, leadership camps, competitions, grade point averages, extra-curricular activities, public affairs, scholarships, MCJROTC academies, national level competitions and unit camaraderie.

Como Park MCJROTC cadets conduct many fundraisers throughout the year to fund their future events and adventures. They have volunteered for many years at the state fair and provide a valuable service to the State Fair Sanitation Department by helping keep the fair clean. In addition to volunteering to keep the fair clean, they also led the daily parade with their fantastic color guard led by Color Sergeant Rigoberto Flores.

The Minnesota Navy League VP Communications Pat Dolan was on the Dan Patch stage to present the award to the Como Park MCJROTC Cadet First Lieutenant Rigoberto Flores, Cadet First Sergeant Cooper Westrum, Cadet Corporal Soe Thoo, and Cadet Lance Corporal Hsa Lae. The award will be used to set up a Raider Team. Raiders promote esprit de corps, teamwork, selfconfidence, self-discipline as well as physical fitness. It provides JROTC cadets a competitive program in five (with the option of additional events) mentally and physically challenging training events which take place outdoors. Each team has 9 members. 8 of which will compete in the various events. There must be at least 1 female as part of the 8. After completion of 4 events, each team will run a 5K which should be in formation and one cadet carrying a guidon.



A Message from the Minnesota Council President



Every September, for the past 22 years, I pause and reflect on our Sea Services, the work they perform, and the world in which they perform it. It's not a behavior that comes naturally but one borne from tragedy. Today, I see the Services doing great things, under-resourced, overworked, in a world of growing uncertainty and regional instability.

Our Services have borne the burden of near constant deployments and poor material support driven by fiscal uncertainty over the past 20 years. China has risen from the peasant fields of the 1950's to become a peer threat. Russia marches on with its war against democracy in the Ukraine. Iran is normalizing ties with Middle Eastern nations. North Korea plots. Our alliances are frayed.

As an advocate for the Sea Services, I would be remiss if I did not encourage you to contact your elected representatives and ask them to put partisan politics aside and see the Services can ill-afford budget impasses and diplomatic indifference. A weakened and under-resourced Navy, Marine Corps, Coast Guard, and Military Sealift Command only embolden those who wish to attack the US. I've lived through that; it doesn't end well.

Like many who were alive on September 11th, 2001, I can remember exactly where I was when the horror of that day unfolded in real time. I watched on live TV the second plane hit the world trade center - I was off watch, living in Germany, on the phone with the Senior Watch Officer asking him what he needed. I heard the Pentagon was hit. I tried calling my friend Darin who worked in the Chief of Naval Operations Intelligence Plot. I sent him an email. In less than an hour, I was on watch again, trying to glue together what happened for the next morning's intelligence briefing. I wouldn't get any sleep for the next three days. I never heard from Darin again.

As an advocate, I would be remiss if I didn't say how important it is to remember and celebrate, even in these uncertain times. Life in the Sea Services is never easy. And from tragedy, we are allowed a rare opportunity to reset our focus on things that bring us joy, as we will need those memories of happiness to bring us through the darkest hours.

As summer has come to a close, we now look forward to opportunities to commemorate and celebrate traditions and honor those brave souls who have gone before us. To toast the victories of our Services from the Revolutionary War to the War on Terror.

Next month, on the 28th of October, we will celebrate the 248th Birthday of the US Navy at the Radisson Blu in Bloomington. Later on this year, there will be the 124th Army/Navy Game, to be held on December 9th. Similar to last year, we will be celebrating this occasion by joining forces with the Association of the US Army.

As in all years past, I will lift a glass in honor and remembrance of those who cannot be there with us, enjoy the camaraderie with those who are present, and with a little luck, celebrate Christmas with an early gift...A Navy WIN and a passed defense budget!

USS Minneapolis - Saint Paul News

USS Minneapolis-Saint Paul - A Test of the Ship and the Crew.

MAYPORT, Fla. (September 18, 2023) – The Freedom-variant littoral combat ship USS Minneapolis-Saint Paul (LCS 21) has completed a productive summer with an extremely busy third quarter. The ship and her crew represented the fleet in Bristol Rhode Island during the annual Independence Day celebration and completed the final milestones of Combat Systems Ship's Qualification Trials (CSSQT).

USS Minneapolis-Saint Paul kicked off the quarter in a very patriotic manner. Bristol, RI began the Annual Bristol 4th of July Celebration in 1785 with the Military, Civic and Fireman's parade. USS Minneapolis-Saint Paul was one of the main attractions during the 238th Annual Celebration. The crew was excited to show off their ship and provided tours to the public and to civic leaders. The town hosted Sailors at several events, reinforcing positive relationships between the U.S. Navy and local citizens. The crew culminated the visit by marching in the Independence Day Parade.

USS Minneapolis-Saint Paul completed a ship-wide evolution known as Combat Systems Ship's Qualification Trials. CSSQT is a Naval Sea Systems Command requirement for newly commissioned ships. These various trials take months of preparation, repetition and execution to ensure all combat systems are operable to their designed capabilities. In the month of August, USS Minneapolis-Saint Paul completed final systems testing successfully from start to finish. The crew was ecstatic for the final test as it was a Live Fire Event (LFE) of the onboard air defense system known as SeaRAM.

As the ship works towards its first deployment, the warfare area leaders are preparing for certifying events with Afloat Training Group Mayport. These events encompass the beginning of the ship's training phase, commonly known as Basic Phase. The primary focus of this quarter was Antiterrorism, Damage Control, and Fleet Support Operations-Medical (FSO-M) warfare areas.

Most recently and ending our final month for the third quarter, USS Minneapolis-Saint Paul supported NASA's SpaceX Crew-7 spacecraft launch. The ship provided a secondary Search and Rescue platform for Crew-7's mission to the International Space Station.

The Sailors onboard USS Minneapolis-Saint Paul proudly displayed technical expertise, professionalism and dedication during every evolution and event. The crew will continue to build upon its accomplishments and focus on additional certifications in the final quarter of the year as the ship prepares for more success in 2024 and beyond.



During their operations they embarked crews from other sister ships for training evolutions while those ships were in various stages of maintenance periods. VP Legislative Affairs

You don't have to look too far and wide to see the challenges underway on the global stage involving the United States. The war in Ukraine now entering its

20th month. Kim Jong Un meeting with Vladimir Putin to discuss arms for oil trading. The US armed forces missing their recruiting numbers across the board, stressing our ops tempo and ability to maintain forces in place for global security. While there is a plethora of news in the press concerning our Navy and Marine teams there is one significant issue on the table before us as a Nation that is of great concern and consternation.

There is one standstill among many on capitol hill which is having a significant impact on our military. US Senator, Tommy Tuberville, (R-AL) the junior senator, is holding up Flag and General Officers promotions with unprecedented firmness. Currently there are approximately 400+ promotions and changes of command on hold by Senator Tuberville. By years end, the Department of Defense expects over 500 active-duty senior commands will have been affected.

Recently the Senate was able to confirm a new Marine Commandant Marine Corps Gen. Eric M. Smith; General of the Army, Randy A. George; and Chairman of the Joint Chiefs Air Force Gen. Charles Q. Brown Jr. Still waiting on her confirmation is Navy Adm. Lisa M. Franchetti as Chief of Naval Operations

If you are not familiar with the situation at hand, and it's hard not to hear about it, the three Secretaries of the Navy, Air Force and Army recently penned an article to the Washington Post on the impacts this is having on the military. https://

The result of Senator Tuberville's action is putting our sailors, seamen, soldiers, and infantry at risk. As a Nation we have been taught to lead from the front. We should not tolerate, nor condone his singular desire to grab the helm and steer the entire DOD ship into the abyss he believes only in his mind it should sail.

I urge you to get familiar with the specifics of what is happening and then take up a pen, or email and drop a note to our elected Senators Amy Klobuchar and Tina Smith urging them to work on a solution to this significant national security problem.

VP Legislative Affairs (Cont)

The House of Representatives saw a week of great expectations and dashed hopes. With little time to spare before the September 30th funding deadline, Speaker McCarthy tried everything to push a framework for a Continuing Resolution through his caucus, but to no avail. Despite numerous concessions to GOP hardliners, and significant optimism after a Wednesday evening meeting, by Thursday it was clear that no real progress had been made. Two attempts to advance defense funding legislation also failed amidst the ongoing GOP rebellion.

It is likely Speaker McCarthy will continue attempting to tweak the GOP Continuing Resolution in an attempt to appease the handful of holdouts, but if that fails, he will either need to cut a deal with Democrats or take responsibility for a government shutdown. A bipartisan coalition is already discussing a basic plan for a Continuing Resolution that would fund the government at current levels until January 2024 while also including some border security provisions and Ukraine aid. If McCarthy cannot pass a bill with just the support of his Republican colleagues, he may need to take up the bipartisan legislation. We all hope that clearer minds will prevail in the coming days.

She also delivered flowers with American flags to veterans Homes and the Veterans Hospitals in St. Cloud and the Twin Cities for the Fourth of July and continues to send birthday greetings to those who requested birthday drive by Salutes during Covid.



VP Youth Programs

The Naval Sea Cadet Corps ("Sea Cadets") is the flagship youth development program the Navy League sponsors. Although the Leaguer Cadets (ages 10 - 13) are also part of the program, Sea Cadets is for teenagers 13 years and older. The first accomplishment of a new Sea Cadet is to attend Sea Cadet Recruit Training, an intense 10-day curriculum of physical and mental development in an age-appropriate pseudo-military environment. Here, new Sea Cadets learn discipline, to follow instructions, and to perform as a team.

I had the privilege of attending the Sea Cadet Recruit Training graduation ceremony at Great Lakes Recruit Training Command (RTC) in Illinois on July 2. This event was the real deal, held at the same facility where the US Navy trains its new Sailors. This year's event was particularly noteworthy in that it was the first time since 2013 that Sea Cadets to be able to train there alongside the Navy's new Sailors, with training instruction provided by the US Navy's Recruit Training Company Commanders.

Sea Cadets were not able to train aboard RTC Great Lakes for the previous nine years for various reasons, with alternative training locations including National Guard facilities, college campuses, and retreat centers.



RT Great Lakes

Up through 2013, as many as 400 new male and female Sea Cadets trained at RTC Great Lakes each summer. This year, the Navy agreed to start small by allowing a single company of male Sea Cadets in order to demonstrate the feasibility of our returning to their facility. There were 36 male Sea Cadet recruits, four staff cadets, and several very capable Sea Cadet Officers – unpaid adult volunteers. Every one of the Sea Cadets who began Recruit Training graduated, another impressive accomplishment. Sea Cadet Petty Officer Second Class Maguire Weiland, from Twin Cities Squadron, was one of the four staff cadets.

My official capacity as a guest was as the National Vice Chairman of Sea Cadets. I spoke with Captain Kertreck Brooks, Commanding Officer of RTC Great Lakes, prior to the graduation ceremony. He said that he, his staff, and the US Navy were all impressed with the performance of our Sea Cadets, and that they are able and very willing to support our presence there next year and beyond with the goal of increasing the number of Sea Cadets each year while also adding female cadets, staff cadets, and staff officers in the near future.

This accomplishment of returning our Sea Cadets to RTC Great Lakes was facilitated by Captain Bill Radomski, USN (Ret.), our Sea Cadets Area Commander for the Midwest Area (one of six geographic areas within our national program). This summer's experience demonstrates the dedication and energy that our dedicated adult Sea Cadets volunteers provide, and the talent of our very small Headquarters Staff, who all keep the Sea Cadets the best youth development program in America.

CDR Christopher Schmid is a native of Inlet, NY. He enlisted in 1997 as a Machinist Mate and completed his first enlistment on board the submarine USS Scranton where he screened for Broadened Opportunity for Officer Selection and Training program. He graduated from Jacksonville University with a Bachelor's of Science in Computer Information Systems and received his commission through the Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps program.

In June 2005, he reported to the USS Vicksburg (CG-69) as the Main Propulsion Assistant and completed his follow-on tour on the USS Wasp (LHD-1) as the Fire Control Officer.

After leaving the USS Wasp, he deployed to Jalalabad, Afghanistan on a Global War on Terrorism Support Assignment as an Embedded Training Team member where he mentored Afghanistan National Army Officers.

Reported in January 2010 to the Naval Postgraduate School and graduated with a Master's degree in Business Administration focusing on Government Financial Management and completed the Joint Professional Military Education (Phase I) as well as the Certified Defense Financial Manager with Acquisition certification.

Reported in June 2011 to Command Navy Reserve Forces Command for duties in the N8 where he rotated within the department working for the Reserve Personnel Navy appropriation director, the Program Objective Memorandum director, and the Operations and Maintenance Navy Reserve appropriation director.

Reported in June 2011 to Special Operations Command (SOCOM) as a Joint Strength Manager within J1 where he was responsible for managing SOCOM's Joint Duty Assignment List well as all Reserve augmentation requests across the enterprise. During his tour, he completed the Joint Professional Military Education (Phase II)

Reported in August 2017 to Navy Operational Support Center Schenectady as the Commanding Officer where he provided training, support, guidance and administrative oversight to 7 Reserve Units and 12 FTS personnel supporting a drilling population of 185 Reservists and a \$107K OPTAR budget. During this tour, he completed the Professional Human Resources certification. Reported in July 2019 to Navy Region Mid-Atlantic Reserve Component Command as the Operations, Mobilizations, and Training Officer providing oversite to 14 FTS staff members. Managed training, travel, Armed watch stander and mobilization programs for the region while executing \$1.5M ADT funding, \$300K training support, and \$1.7M travel funding annually. Reported in July 2021 to U.S. Fleet Forces Command and is currently the Executive Assistant to Director, Fleet Personnel Development and Allocation (N1).

Currently, CDR Schmid has deployed five times and surged seven times. Personal decorations include the Bronze Star, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal (3 awards), Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal (2 awards), Joint Service Achievement Medal, and Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal.

These exams ensure that these vessels are safe to transit US waters. Our Port State Control Examiners demonstrated to the Cadets how to conduct a Port State Control Exam.

August 4 is celebrated as Coast Guard Day to honor the establishment on that day in 1790 of the Revenue Cutter Service. On that date, Congress, guided by Secretary of the Treasury Alexander Hamilton along with President George Washington signed into law the 1790 Tariff Act. This authorized the building of a fleet of ten cutters, whose responsibility would be enforcement of the first tariff laws enacted by Congress under the Constitution. MSU Duluth



NAIP Navy League Newsletter Input-September 2023

It's been another busy quarter for the United States Naval Academy Information Program (NAIP). In July, NAIP teamed up with NTAG Northern Plains and the Minnesota Council at the Duluth Airshow which featured the Navy's Flight Demonstration Squadron, the Blue Angels. Blue and Gold Officers (BGOs) provided information to many visitors throughout the three days of the airshow. Of particular interest to visitors was not only information on applying to compete for Naval Academy admission, but also for information on USNA summer programs such as the summer STEM camps, summer sports camps and the Naval Academy Summer Seminar. Applications for the 2024 summer programs will be available in January 2024 at www.usna.edu. Interviews have begun for applicants for USNA's class of 2028. Individual Blue and Gold Officer interviews are conducted as potential Midshipmen open a USNA application and are evaluated as competitive candidates for admission. Congressional interviews require a separate application for each office. Congressional interviews will take place from early October to early December 2023. Most Congressional applications are due in October or early November. Candidates should check the individual Congressional websites for details. Senate interviews are scheduled for November 18, 2023.

Congressional Offices are again sponsoring service academy information nights at various locations throughout each Congressional District. Currently, Minnesota's Congressional District 3 Information session is scheduled for October 4th at Providence Academy. Congressional Districts 2 and 6 are scheduled for the evening of October 11, 2023. Each information session will provide an overview of each of the United States service academies and also give guidance on applying to each academy. Check each district website for details. The Naval Academy's Operation Information (OPINFO) is currently in the planning stages. A Navy specific officer programs presentation is again being planned for the week of Thanksgiving. This program will take place at Saint Thomas Academy on Tuesday, November 21, 2023 and will provide information from USNA, NTAG and NROTC on various Navy and Marine Corps officer programs available. This event also provides the opportunity to compare life in the various programs from the perspective of current Midshipmen who are enrolled in each officer program.

Congressional Districts that are considered as under represented at USNA are an annual concern. This October 1-6, Ensign Wagner, a recent Naval Academy graduate from Minnesota, will be visiting schools in Minnesota's 5th Congressional District. Ensign Wagner is currently assigned to the USNA Office of Admissions. He will be discussing the various aspects of USNA, personal qualifications for an academy appointment and the USNA admissions process with interested students.

As always, new BGOs are being sought throughout Minnesota. There is a particular need for BGO representation in southern Minnesota. DID YOU KNOW? By Brandon Montanye

September marked the 10th anniversary of the commissioning of the USS Minnesota (SSN-783). She is the third ship to bear the name Minnesota. The second was the battleship Minnesota (BB-22), both ships were named after the state. The first was named after the Minnesota River. She was a steam frigate launched in 1855.

Did you know that the Stream frigate Minnesota took part in one of the most significant naval battles in world history?

March 8-9, 1862 the Battle of Hampton Roads took place where the James, Nansemond, and Elizabeth rivers converge before entering the Chesapeak Bay. This battle was significant in that it was the first engagement between ironclad warships, the USS Monitor and CSS Virginia. Sometimes referred to as the Battle of the Monitor and Merrimack (rebuilt and renamed CSS Virginia) or the Battle of the Ironclads. These ships were steam powered and platted with iron or steel, an innovative design for warships of the time.

The battle was an effort by the Confederacy to break the Union blockade that was cutting off Norfolk and Richmond, the Confederacy's major industrial centers. The morning of the 8th, the CSS Virginia got underway from the Gosport Navy Yard in Portsmouth, VA. She advanced at a speed of 8 knots, and it took her 3 hours to make contact with the Union ships.

The CSS Virginia initially engaged and destroyed the Unions ships USS Cumberland and USS Congress, both wooden vessels. Even though both ships fired repeatedly at the ironclad, the ship sustained no major damage. Her next target was the USS Minnesota, that had run aground in an effort to join the battle. Due to darkness and the falling tide, Virginia suspended her attack until the morning.

Meanwhile, during the night, the USS Monitor was rushed to Hampton Roads to protect the Union Fleet from the CSS Virginia. The Monitor received orders that their primary mission was to protect Minnesota.




Upon arrival, the Monitor positioned herself near the grounded Minnesota and waited for the impending battle. Initially the Virginia's crew thought the Monitor was a boiler being towed by the Minnesota. They realized that it was not a boiler and commenced firing. Virginia's first round hit Minnesota and she returned fire with a broadside shot. After fighting for several hours neither ironclad could overcome the other. Monitor received a hit to her turret and had to maneuver away from the engagement, but later turned back towards the fight. Virginia thought Monitor was retreating, and with the tides going out, returned to Norfolk. Monitor thought Virginia was retreating. Since the tasking was to protect Minnesota, they did not pursue. Due to confusion, both sides thought they had won the battle.

This battle had a major impact on naval warfare because the world took notice of the innovative use of armor in the design of warships. Which would eventually evolve into battleships. The USS Minnesota was the catalyst for the first engagement between ironclads. USS Minnesota's bell still exists and is housed at the Minnesota History Center in Saint Paul. And now you know.
