A Message from the Minnesota Council Incoming President Joe Fraser



Shipmates,

I am honored and humbled to have been selected to serve as the next President of the Minnesota chapter of the United States Navy League. I want to thank our out-going President, Bill James, for his extraordinary leadership and steady hand on the tiller these past challenging years.

In the 1890's Alfred Thayer Mahon articulated the need for a strong naval presence because he foresaw the important role the world oceans would play in geo-political and economic

policies of the United States, its Allies, and its competitors. Over one hundred years later, the stakes could not be higher for the economic stability or national security of the United States.

Recently, the Brookings Institute highlighted that the United States economy relies heavily on the global flow of goods, both consumer and commercial, and energy across the oceans. That fact has been brought to the forefront of American politics and coffee shop conversations by supply chain interruptions in the Suez Canal and the Port of Long Beach, along with their inflationary effects. Additionally, there are vital industries like finance and technology that rely on the flow of data, not goods, and over 90 percent of all data in the world flows through undersea cables that line the ocean floor...There's no part of our Nation that would not be adversely impacted if ocean-based trade were impeded or slowed.

The United States is in the Era of Great Power Competition, where a rival nation seeks to influence or control the critical sea lines of communication to leverage them in order to cast its economic influence and anti-democratic political philosophies on the Nations of the World. The United States Sea Services seek to ensure that does not happen. We can ill afford to allow the public to ignore this critical issue or become complacent of it. Therefore, it is my goal for our Chapter to continue to elevate public awareness and discussions of the key roles the Sea Services play in keeping our economy and our national security protected.

I intend to follow the four elements of the strategic plan laid out by the Council for 2022 and 2023. Those areas are:

Museum Brings Decommissioned Submarine Home to Minnesota ~ USS Minneapolis-Saint Paul to be permanently on display in Little Falls in Spring 2025 ~~

The USS Minneapolis-Saint Paul is home. The decommissioned nuclear-powered fast attack submarine's towering sail and rudder have been transported to the Minnesota Military & Veterans Museum in Little Falls from the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard in Bremerton, Washington.

The disassembled pieces arrived at Camp Ripley, Minnesota on Monday, Aug. 29, and the artifact will be a distinctive feature at the new 32-acre Minnesota Military & Veterans Museum & Library, expected to open in Spring 2025. The "sail" of a submarine is the tower-like portion that protrudes from the hull at the center of the boat, and the rudder is at the rear of the vessel.



"While there is a great deal of restoration to make sure these pieces are ready for display, the addition of the sail and rudder of the USS Minneapolis-Saint Paul to the Minnesota Military & Veterans Museum is an important step in continuing to build a world-class museum," said Randal Dietrich, Executive Director of the Minnesota Military & Veterans Museum. "Minnesota is mobilizing to honor the Veterans of all branches of service."

The USS Minneapolis-Saint Paul was a nuclear-powered Los Angeles Class submarine in service between 1984 and 2008. It was the first vessel of the United States Navy to be named for the Twin Cities

metropolitan area. Known with the hull classification of SSN-708, the submarine served with distinction in Operation Desert Shield and the First Gulf War. It was the first submarine to carry Tomahawk missiles specifically designated for use in strikes against Iraq.

"Preserving this vital Naval artifact is important to the men who served on her, but also to the history of Minnesota," said Bill James, United States Navy League Minnesota Council President. "The USS Minneapolis Saint Paul admirably served from 1984-2008 and took part in Operation Desert Shield and the Gulf War. The Navy League and submarine Veterans continue to mourn the deaths of two SSN-708 Sailors who died in rough seas on the coast of southwestern England in 2006. Along with the Minnesota Submarine League we look forward to the restoration of the sail and rudder and placement at the new Minnesota Military & Veterans Museum."

Transported by St. Cloud, Minn. based Anderson Trucking Service, and expertly unloaded by Camp Ripley logisticians, the pieces will receive extensive renovation over the next two years. "This project is a great opportunity to show our support for Veterans and military personnel," said Scott Anderson, Executive Vice President and Chief Administration Officer of Anderson Trucking Service. "We are honored to assist with this amazing addition to the Minnesota Military & Veterans Museum and can't wait to see it come to fruition. Many of our drivers and employees are Veterans, and this is one way that we can honor their service and show how grateful we are."

In a letter to Navy Program Manager Curtis A. Brown, Minnesota Governor Tim Walz said "The sail and rudder will be a fantastic addition to the museum and serve as a reminder to generations of Minnesotans of the service and sacrifices made by the men and women of the United States Navy to preserve our freedom."

United State Naval Academy Midshipmen Tour USS Minneapolis-Saint Paul ANNAPOLIS, MD, UNITED STATES 09.06.2022 Story by Lt. Anthony Junco - Commander, Littoral Combat Ship Squadron TWO

ANNAPOLIS, MARYLAND (Sept. 6, 2022) – The Freedom-variant littoral combat ship USS Minneapolis-Saint Paul (LCS 21) hosted tours for midshipmen from the United States Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland, Sept. 2-6.

The midshipmen visited various spaces on Minneapolis-Saint Paul, including the airborne and waterborne mission zones, the mess decks, the pilot house, and the forecastle of the ship, while subject matter experts on the ship discussed the multitude of ship capabilities.

"I wasn't too knowledgeable about the littoral combat ships before coming on board," said Midshipman 2nd Class Ayush Padhi, a junior at the Naval Academy. "However, after touring the ship, seeing all of the advanced technology and learning how efficient the crew and ship are, I think it's a really great ship."

Prior to the Minneapolis-Saint Paul's arrival, the USNA midshipmen completed their in-depth summer training, where they learned about basic seamanship, basic damage control, navigation, and the various duties and responsibilities of surface warfare officers.

"It was really cool to see that all of the training we did over the summer translates to the fleet very well," said Midshipman 4th Class Charlotte Caywood, a freshman at the Naval Academy. "I didn't come from a Navy family, so this was my first time seeing an actual ship. I never considered the LCS program as an option, and while I still have a long way to go, it will definitely be on my list of options when the time comes."

While discussing the ship's capabilities, the crewmembers also talked about daily life on a littoral combat ship, touching on topics like meal quality, crew morale, and the closeness of the crew.

"You hear a lot about the submarine community, how it operates and how close the community is, and I always thought that was exclusive to the sub community," said Midshipman 3rd Class Jarrod Schad, a sophomore at the Naval Academy. "You don't hear about that level of closeness in the surface community, so it was great to hear that the LCS community is so tight-knit and unique in that manner."

USS Minneapolis-Saint Paul hosts Maryland Deputy Commerce Secretary during Fleet Week

BALTIMORE - U.S. Navy and Maryland Department of Commerce leaders met onboard USS Minneapolis-St. Paul (LCS-21) to discuss and celebrate women leaders in business during Maryland Fleet Week and Flyover Baltimore Friday, September 9.

Rear Adm. Nancy S. Lacore, Commandant, Naval District Washington, opened the meeting by affirming to the members that the Navy is intertwined with the state of Maryland. "It is important to connect with people like you-leaders in the community- to strengthen our relationships through shared experiences, in this case as women in leadership roles," said Lacore to tour members. "Most of our missions take place overseas, where we cannot show the American people the Navy's work, so I hope you will share this experience and anything you learn about your Navy with your family, friends, and co-workers.

The group was comprised of Signe Pringle, Deputy Secretary at Commerce; Tom Riford, Assistant Secretary of Tourism, Film, Arts, Marketing and Communications, Maryland Department of Commerce; Allison Mayer, Deputy Chief of Staff & Infrastructure Director, Maryland Department of Commerce; members of the Naval District Washington and Department of Commerce Staffs; and leadership of USS Minneapolis St. Paul.

As impactful as the tour was for the Women Business Leaders Office leaders, so was the opportunity for the Sailors and officers aboard to meet them. Cmdr. Alfonza White, USS Minneapolis-Saint Paul, Commanding Officer, expressed how it meant much to him to engage with the group as a father of a 15-year-old daughter.

"It means a lot to be able to tell my daughter she can do anything she applies herself to and be able to tell her about other women who have done the same," said White.

Lt. Jeanelle Seals, weapons officer aboard Minneapolis-Saint Paul, echoed that sentiment.

"It was inspiring to see so many women who are leaders in their communities and professional fields," said Seals. "Meeting them and talking about what we've been able to accomplish in our respective careers was the highlight of my trip to Baltimore so far."

Tall Ships Two Harbors 2022

August 4-8, 2022 was Tall Ships Two Harbors 2022. MSU Duluth, Station Duluth, and Aids to Navigation Team (ANT) Duluth worked alongside port partners and other government agencies to make the event safe for the public. The planning for this event started back in January 2022 and everything came together during the 4-day event. This was a safe and memorable event for patrons. MSU Duluth thanks all our port partners that assisted with making the event a success.

On August 16, 2022, MSU Duluth acquired an ROV to utilize for pollution responses. MSU Duluth Pollution Responders can use this critical resource to determine where products may spill under the surface of submerged vessels and locate hazards underwater. August 26, 2022 they unit had a Government Initiated Unannounced Exercise (GIUE). The purpose of these exercises is to test facilities response plan notification and response capabilities for an Average Most Probable Discharge (AMPD) at their facility. Coast Guard Pollution Responders and Facility Inspectors observe the exercise and ensure they are following their response plans.

August 27, 2022 MSU Duluth competed in the Dragon Boat Festival held at Barkers Island in Superior, Wisconsin. Our team won our first heat with a time of 2 minutes and 11 seconds. In the second heat we came in 2nd with a time of 2 minutes and 10 seconds. Overall, our team placed 30th out of 58 teams. This was an excellent team building exercise for all who participated in the race and great morale for the crew! We are looking at coming back stronger next year!

We also have our inspectors going out and doing exams/inspections all across our Area of Response.

Our office would like to remind readers that if you are planning on taking your boat out at night, make sure you have a float plan, have proper safety equipment, ensure the lights on your boat are operational, and have situational awareness of the boating conditions as well as the aids to navigation in the area you will be boating in.

The Minnesota Navy League Council recently provided the SPAR \$250 to recognize their sailor of the quarter. MK3 Adolfo Hernandez. Petty Officer Hernandez serves in the Auxiliary Machinery Division in CUTTER SPAR. During a recent post Midlife Maintenance Availability Petty Officer Hernandez corrected more than 10 discrepancies in the ship's thruster hydraulic oil head tanks, potable water, auxiliary sea water, ship service air, deck hydraulics, and reefer systems.

His diligence and attention to detail decreased the likelihood of catastrophic failure in these vital shipboards installed systems. Petty Officer Hernandez, always the shipmate willing to help, crossed divisions to provide his expertise to Main Propulsion and help tune the main diesel engines. His efforts were critical to complete SPAR's midlife overhaul at Coast Guard Yard early.

Cutter SPAR partnered with NOAA, Attended CG Festival

The Coast Guard Cutter SPAR returned to homeport in Duluth MN after 26 days away. While underway, the ship conducted aids to navigation (Aton) work on twenty navigational buoys and retrieved one buoy which had begun drifting. In addition, the crew partnered with NOAA and Michigan Maritime Academy to mark twelve deep water shipwrecks at depths of 130 to 300+ feet along the West coast of Lake Huron in the National Marine Sanctuary.

Each wreck was first located using an ROV, allowing SPAR to position itself exactly in relation to the wreck. The ROV was then kept on site throughout the operation as the SPAR lowered a dive buoy positioning within feet of the wreck, so divers can easily find it without causing any damage to the 100+ year old wrecks. While aboard, NOAA members also had the opportunity to integrate with the crew, sleeping in various berthing areas as available and share meals with the crew.

To complete her voyage, the SPAR participated in the Coast Guard Festival at Grand Haven MI, entered in procession with her sister ship the Hollyhock and the 140' icebreaking tug Neah Bay. During the festival, all Coast Guard ships were opened to the public for tours, SPAR provided nearly 8,000 tours. Additionally, the crew participated in numerous morale and public events. Most notably participation in the annual memorial service ceremony for the crew of USCGC Escanaba (Hull #77) sunk by a German U-boat during WWII.

Naval Reserve Center - Minneapolis

NRC Minneapolis is participating in the Navy Reserve Force (RESFOR) mobilization exercise MASS-EX 22-2 throughout the month of September. The purpose of the exercise is to flex the Navy Readiness and Mobilization Commands (REDCOM) as well as their subordinate Navy Reserve Centers in their ability to activate 20 percent of their drilling Sailors, identify best practices and capability shortfalls.

In the exercise, the NRC is activating NR 477th Marine Wing Support Squadron (the Navy element of our local USMC reserve command), NR SUBPAC OPS, NR C10F/NIOC TX Det Minneapolis, and NMCB 25 Det Minneapolis, totaling approximately 120 Sailors. This is more than the combined total of mobilizations processed at the NRC over the last 4 years. The exercise was led by the NRC's mobilization officer, Personnel Specialist First Class Jacqueline Smith and Hospital Corpsmen Second Class Victoria Van Esselstine and included each department at the NRC as well as medical providers sent to us by BUMED to provide medical and dental screening. They created and coordinated a plan to transform the drill deck to a mobilization processing site, creating stations for medical, dental, training/ GTCC, personnel records and pay, and IT.

RESFOR's mobilization exercises support the "Mobilize the Force" pillar, one of four pillars contained in Vice Adm. Mustin's Navy Reserve Fighting Instructions. Navy Reserve Fighting Instructions are CNR's plan to shift the Reserve Force's focus from operational support in the form of individual augmentee mobilizations supporting overseas contingency operations in Iraq and Afghanistan, to providing necessary strategic depth as warfighting ready units to support high end conflict.

The other pillars, "Design the Force, Train the Force, and Develop the Force" work in concert to take the approximately 60,000 TAR and Drilling Sailors of the Navy Reserve and create the necessary units, with trained personnel who will be able to promptly provide combat power and combat support when called upon by national leadership.

Mobilize the Force is the pillar that NRC Minneapolis mostly supports, the goal is to be able to mobilize the entire Reserve Force within 30 days of notification. This month's exercise is the fourth of 2022 each focusing on different aspects of the Force, either specific to REDCOMs or specific active commands' reserve organization in a mobilize to billet, which included Littoral Combat Squadron Two last July that coincided with reserve support of the commissioning ceremony of USS Minneapolis Saint Paul (LCS 21).

On Jul. 18, 2020 the US Navy Flight Demonstration Squadron announced six new officers to join the team for the 2023 air show season. The squadron selected two F/A-18E/F Super Hornet pilots, an events coordinator, a C-130J Super Hercules pilot, an aviation maintenance officer and a flight surgeon to replace outgoing team members.

Lt. Amanda Lee, of Mounds View, Minnesota, will be the first woman to serve as a demonstration pilot.

LT Amanda "Stalin" Lee grew up in Mounds View, Minnesota. While attending the University of Minnesota in Duluth and working at UPS, she decided to enlist in the Navy, graduating from Recruit Training Command in Great Lakes, Illinois in 2007. Her successful enlisted career as an Aviation Electronics Technician led to her selection into the Seaman-to-Admiral (STA-21) Commissioning Program. LT Lee received a Bachelor of Science in Biochemistry at Old Dominion University, and earned her commission in August 2013. She was designated a Naval Aviator in April 2016 and recently completed a deployment aboard the USS HARRY S. TRUMAN (CVN 75), in support of Dynamic Force Employment (DFE), Operation INHERENT RESOLVE (OIR), as well as numerous exercises with NATO Allies.

In 2019, Lee was part of the first ever all-female flyover as part of the funeral service for retired Navy Capt. Rosemary Mariner, one of the first female Navy jet pilots and the first woman to command an operational naval aviation squadron.

While Lee is the first woman who will fly an F/A-18E/F for the squadron, she isn't the first woman to take to the skies with the Blue Angels. That honor goes to Marine Maj. Katie Higgins, who flew the team's C-130 Fat Albert transport plane 2014 to 2016.

She also spoke briefly at the monthly meetings for Ashby American Legion, VFW and Lions Club informing them of the benefits of joining the Navy League.

She also volunteered for the Gold Star Foundation Motorcycle Ride that raises money and awareness for Gold Star families and the Boots on the Ground Veterans Motorcycle Fun Run Fundraiser for the Veterans Home in Fergus Falls.

DID YOU KNOW?

In May of 1986 the movie Top Gun was released in theaters. It gave the world a glimpse into Naval Aviation and made a movie star out of the F-14 Tomcat. Sadly, the F-14 was phased out of the Navy's inventory in 2006, with a sunsetting ceremony on the 22nd of September of that year. The Tomcat was replaced by the newer F/A-18 Hornet, an aircraft that was seen as more cost effective in production and maintenance. With the recent release of Top Gun: Maverick, we saw the venerable F-14 Tomcat in action again. But did you know that you can see an F-14 Tomcat right here in Minnesota?

F-14A Tomcat BUNO 160914 is located at the Wilmar Municipal Airport (BDH / KBDH) and is proudly on display. She started her life with the Navy being assigned to the "Gunfighters" of VF-124. This was the Fleet Replacement Squadron (FRS) for the West Coast. They trained newly winged Aviators how to operate the F-14. In June 1981 she was transferred to VF-211 the "Fighting Checkmates" where she was designated as the Carrier Air Group/Carrier Air Wing Commanders (CAG) aircraft. Her last operational squadron assignment was with the "Black Lions" of VF-213. She was then sent to VF-101 the "Grim Reapers," the East Coast FRS. In August of 1999 she was flown to the Naval Air Reserve Center, at the Minneapolis International Airport. She was stricken from the list and was to be used as a training asset for the Reserve unit.



The Reserve Unit did use the aircraft for training but had issues obtaining the ground support equipment and specialty tools designed for the Tomcat. According to the former Commanding Officer of the Unit, Captain Chip Scharratt, USNR (Ret), the plan was to have a dedicated space in the current Reserve Center building to house the Tomcat.

Because the decision was made by Commander, Naval Reserve Force to no longer keep BUNO 160914 in their inventory before the building was constructed, that space was reutilized when it was built.

In May of 2007 She was moved to Wilmar Municipal Airport. The instruments and two engines were removed prior to the transport by the Navy, but the two seats were kept in the aircraft. Her flight control surfaces were removed for transport, and she was escorted by the Minnesota State Patrol between Midnight and Five A.M. Pat Curry, a former Airport Commission member, was the lead on raising public and private funds to get the fighter jet to Wilmar.

Out of the 712 F-14s that were built, only 88 remain on public display. Tomcats were literally put on the chopping block after they were no longer used by the Navy. The primary reason was to prevent Iran from obtaining spare parts. Iran is the only country in the world that still operates the F-14.

She proudly sits on display at the Wilmar Airport. One side of the aircraft has the livery of VF-101 and the other side the logo for the decommissioned Naval Air Reserve unit of Minneapolis. And now you know.
